PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Congregants,

As we look forward to Rabbi David Katz joining us in July, we must say goodbye to Rabbi Linda Joseph, who will be leaving us at the end of the month. We thank Rabbi Joseph for everything she has done for Har Sinai Congregation during the past three years. She has taught us, led us in prayer, shared our happy times and provided comfort to families in times of need. We wish her well and much success in her new position as Rabbi at Bet Aviv in Columbia.

Please join us on Friday June 21, for Shabbat Services, which will be the Rabbi's final Erev Shabbat Service at Har Sinai Congregation. Local storyteller Jennifer Zunikoff will join us for a special storytelling presentation in Rabbi's honor during the service.

As you should also be aware, the month of May was a historic time for Har Sinai Congregation as we formalized the merger process with Temple Oheb Shalom. On May 14, both Congregational Presidents signed a Letter of Intent to merge. Since that date, we have continued to move forward in the merger process. We have jointly started the due diligence review of financial and legal obligations of the two congregations, including the signing of an agreement with Whiteford, Taylor & Preston L.L.P. to advise us on the legal aspects of merging the two congregations.

We have also started the planning for merging our Posner JEM program with Temple Oheb Shalom's Religious School to ensure a smooth transition for all our

students and their families. The Educators from both congregations, Nina Pachino and Aviva Janus, are meeting regularly and are off to a great start. This will also include an overdue revitalization of the program available for those students in grades 8-12. We also met this past week to establish a rate structure for the school program to ensure that everyone, regardless of previous congregational affiliation, is paying the same fees. I am happy to let you know that this will result in a modest savings to our members.

You will soon hear about the formation of additional working groups to start addressing the many elements required to merge two historic congregations. We will need the support of all congregants to assist with these working groups.

A complete schedule for Joint Summer Services with Temple Oheb Shalom is included in this issue on pages 13-14. The first joint service will be on June 28 at Temple Oheb Shalom. This will be a great opportunity to start meeting Oheb congregants as well as Interim Rabbi Marc Disick.

Please join us on Sunday, June 9 at 10:00 a.m. in the Sanctuary for our Shavuot/Yizkor Service with Confirmation. This year's confirmands include Linnie Ulick, Maddie Koenig, Brandon Delia and Eliana Palmer. I congratulate all of them on reaching this milestone in their lives and wish them and their families Mazel Tov.

With regard to the sale of the building, we have received a Letter of Intent from one

interested organization. As the negotiations are ongoing, I can't share any of the details at this time, other than to say I am very hopeful that we will be able to move forward with them.

These are historic and exciting times for Har Sinai Congregation. It is my extreme honor and pleasure to serve as President. I can't begin to tell you how much I appreciate the support that I have received from all of you.

Rabbi David Katz Joins Har Sinai as New Interim

HAVE A CHAT with Rabbi David Katz and it becomes clear pretty quickly why the Rochester, New York, native has turned his rabbinical knowledge and skills toward helping guide congregations in transition as an interim rabbi. Even over the phone, Katz exudes warmth, humor, energy and candor – traits that prove necessary for successful interim clergy.

The members of Har Sinai Congregation's rabbi search committee, busy over the last several months searching for an interim, recently made it official with a May 19 vote to bring Katz to the Owings Mills Reform congregation beginning July 1.

Finishing up his current interim position at Temple B'Nai Or, in Morristown, New Jersey, Katz said he is looking forward "to leading Har Sinai, helping to lead both congregations into the future with my colleague Rabbi Disick."

Katz and Rabbi Marc L. Disick, interim rabbi at Temple Oheb Shalom, will become fast colleagues as they work with the congregations during a proposed merger process.

Current plans call for both organizations to perform their due legal and organizational diligence this summer, in preparation for a congregational vote on the merger in September of 2019. Both rabbis are slated to stay until a projected date of summer 2020, when a new, permanent rabbi is proposed to be in place to head the newly merged congregation.

Katz is looking forward to the challenge and is excited about working with Disick as the two help build and solidify the bridges between the two historic congregations. Since 2011, Katz has performed interim rabbi duties at six congregations, including in California, Pennsylvania, New York, Georgia and most recently in New Jersey.

Prior to that, Katz worked as a Jewish educator and scholar in residence. He spent 16 years as spiritual leader of Temple Israel Reform Congregation of Staten Island, New York, where he led interfaith efforts in the community.

But being a rabbi wasn't always in his stars.

Even as a youngster, Katz was interested in acting and began taking acting lessons when he was seven. That interest continued through a master's in theater at Northwestern University and a number of theater companies.

Growing up in Rochester, the family attended Temple B'rith Kodesh and Katz went to public schools along with Hebrew school, where he began his love of the Hebrew language. In college, as an undergrad and grad student, he studied theater and his interest in acting morphed into a talent for directing, some drama, but mostly comedies.

"I have a deep interest in laughter and humor — why people laugh," Katz said. "Humor is an important part of our lives. I would say joy is something of a human experience and a religious theme."

From directing comedies and studying the arts and literature, Katz moved on to Hebrew Union College (HUC), earning both an MA in Hebrew Letters in 1978 and a year later another MA in Hebrew Education.

"There are certain connections to be sure. Theater is an art that is about life and about people, and about studying a script and finding what's underneath it and the motivations of characters," he said. "That's an easy transition to interpreting text and trying to understand people and having a message to communicate."

His penchant for teaching started when he was a teen, when he and a high school friend taught a post-confirmation class. Katz was ordained in 1981 at HUC, earned his Reform Jewish Educator title in 1986 and his Doctor of Divinity in 2006. In 2012 he received his interim ministry certification.

"I have been a Jewish educator in many ways," Katz said. "Whenever teaching is there, my heart is there."

Coming into his seventh position leading a congregation as an interim rabbi, Katz finds the work "very rewarding."

"I have an analytical nature, and it is often [like] the pieces of a jigsaw puzzle," Katz

said. "Where you can help a congregation through whatever transition it's experiencing. It's appealing to be able to be honest ... and to be of real help."

Katz is looking forward to his move to Baltimore, which he said is known for its "tight-knit" Jewish community with a "strong identity." He was impressed with the Har Sinai leadership and congregants he met during his interview process.

"I believe that the people who I was speaking to and those who were interviewing me, were people of quality, who were intelligent, sincere and devoted. And that's always a good foundation when you walk into a community and you have people who want everything to succeed; they want the synagogue to succeed, and they want the rabbi to succeed," Katz said. "So that's the beginning foundation: that there was honesty, straightforwardness and concern for the welfare of the community."

"I told the [search] committee I appreciate the challenges, and there will be challenges in the coming year because merging is like getting married. You learn about your partner and you grow close and then you become united," he added. "That will be complicated and exciting and I look forward to the success that I know will come."

Katz is married to painter and ceramic artist Nancy Katz and the couple have two children. J

MINUTES FROM THE MEETING OF THE HSC BOARD OF TRUSTEES:

Tuesday, May 14, 2019

RABBI KATZ

Rabbi Katz and Ken signed the Letter of Intent for his new position as our one-year Interim Rabbi. The Board of Trustees voted to approve the contract with Rabbi Katz, which will now be presented to the entire Congregation for approval at the Annual Meeting on May 19.

SHAVUOT WEEKEND

Brotherhood will be honoring Cantor Robert Gerber as Man of the Year during the Brotherhood Shabbat Service on June 7. On June 8, there will be a Shavuot family program at the home of Bruz Frenkil (5-7:00 p.m.). Sunday morning is the Shavuot Yizkor service and also Confirmation for Linnie Ulick, Brandon Delia, Eliana Palmer and Maddie Koenig (10:00 a.m.). It's followed by lunch.

FINANCIAL REPORT

The current financial report was shared with those in attendance and questions were addressed by Howard Kahn.

SUMMER SERVICES with OHEB SHALOM

We have agreed to reinstate joint summer temple services with Temple Oheb Shalom. The first service will be on June 28 with Rabbi Disick and Cantor Gerber at Temple Oheb Shalom. Services on July 5 and July 12 will be separate so that our new Interim Rabbi will have a better opportunity to meet our members. July 19 and 26 and August 2 will be at Temple Oheb Shalom. Services on August 9, 16, 23 and 30 will be at Har Sinai Congregation.

LETTER OF INTENT (LOI) – JOINT TASK FORCE

If both congregations' Boards vote on and approve the LOI, it will be jointly signed by Ken Bell and Vicki Spira, President of Temple Oheb Shalom, at Temple Oheb Shalom tonight and publicized tomorrow.

- **Congregational Name:**

There will be a brand-new name which will be in place by High Holy Days of 2020 or before, which will not have any of the words of either of our current names.

- **Governance:**

There will be a transitional Board of Trustees consisting of 25 people with

ten from our members and 15 from theirs with an EC of 7 with two presidents, two Executive Vice Presidents, two secretaries and one treasurer. New bylaws will be created. They will dictate the timing and composition of the future Boards. The transitional Board will serve for approximately two years.

- **Location**

Our new House of Worship will be at the current location of Temple Oheb Shalom. There will be a committee equally consisting of their and our members to allocate space to adequately display the history of both congregations.

Other Key Elements:

We will combine our resources. We will honor all contracts in place. Any new contracts entered into between now and September will have to be approved by the Joint Task Force. A Rabbinic Search Committee will be appointed with a fifty percent composition from each temple. Religious School to be combined for 2019-2020 academic year.

Due Diligence

With the signing of this document we open up a 75-day period of due diligence when each congregation will be asked to provide a series of documents to the external attorney to review.

The LOI was unanimously approved by the Board of Trustees.
